Florence G'SELL is a professor of private law at the University of Lorraine and leads the Digital, Governance and Sovereignty Chair at Sciences Po. She began her academic career working mainly on tort law, judicial systems and comparative law. For the past several years, she has been working on digital law and in particular on issues related to the regulation of on line platforms, the way law can deal with new technologies (Blockchain, Metaverse), the notion of digital sovereignty and, more generally, digital policies in the EU and the US.

Florence G'sell is a graduate of Sciences Po and holds the French "agrégation de droit privé et sciences criminelles". She has edited and published several books on digital issues, including *Le Big Data et le Droit* (Dalloz, 2021) and *Justice Numérique* (Dalloz, 2022). Recently, she published "Les réseaux sociaux, entre encadrement et auto-régulation" (Sciences Po, Digital, Governance and Sovereignty Chair, 2021), "AI Judges" (in Larry A. Dimatteo, Cristina Poncibo, Michel Cannarsa (edit.), *The Cambridge Handbook of Artificial Intelligence, Global Perspectives on Law and Ethics*, Cambridge University Press, 2022), and "The Digital Services Act: a General Assessment" (in Antje von Ungern-Sternberg (ed.), *Content Regulation in the European Union – The Digital Services Act*, Institute for Digital Law (IRDT), Trier April 2023). She has also co-authored the Council of Europe report entitled "The Impact of Blockchains for Human Rights, Democracy and the Rule of Law" (with Florian Martin-Bariteau, 2022).

During the 2023-2024 academic year, Florence G'sell is visiting professor at the Cyber Policy Center of Stanford University.
