Emma Armstrong-Carter is now a post-doctoral research fellow at the University of California, Berkeley. She will begin the National Science Foundation post-doctoral research fellowship at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in October 2022.

Emma's research program lies at the intersection of child development, data science, and education policy.

She researches how children's experiences of helping others (e.g., family and peers) can promote their own learning and wellbeing. Further, she investigates how children's experiences helping others can both exacerbate and mitigate the challenges that many children experience in homes with family disability, family illness, or difficult relationships.

This transdisciplinary, integrative research addresses multiple contexts of development including family, school, neighborhood, and geographic influences. It also informs the design of school- and government-based policies that support children's educational success.

Emma graduated with her Ph.D from the Stanford Graduate School of Education in April 2022. She was also a fellow in the Stanford Data Science Initiative and the Institute of Education Sciences Center for Education Policy Analysis.
