As such, she directed the Social Emergency Medicine fellowship and was medical director for a student-run group which screened ED patients for social needs (Stanford Health Advocates and Research in the ED (SHAR(ED)). She has worked clinically and educated trainees and faculty globally, including at sites in Chiapas, Mexico; Borneo Indonesia and Galapagos, Ecuador. Her current research and advocacy includes investigating disparities in specialty care access and quality, including trauma and mental health and the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic on Asian American populations. She has been a medical expert for the Flores Settlement Agreement witnessing the conditions of detention for unaccompanied immigrant children. Dr. Wang received a Stanford Impact Lab Fellowship to provide wraparound social and medical services for unaccompanied immigrant children who have settled in the US. Most recently, she has been appointed as Faculty Director of the new REACH MD/MS Program in Health Equity Research at the Stanford School of Medicine.
